10:30am-1:00pm panel: Addressing the unprecedented global challenge of food insecurity and risk of famine: scaling up prevention, response, and resilience

The largest global food crisis in modern history has been unfolding, with the world witnessing unprecedented levels of food insecurity. In 2022, at least 222 million people across 53 countries experienced high levels of acute food insecurity and needed urgent assistance. This trajectory has continued to escalate. Women and children are especially bearing the brunt. The risk of famine continues to loom, with millions one step away from famine-like conditions, and hundreds of thousands of people experiencing life-threatening conditions. Malnutrition and wasting amongst children are at record levels. The complex and multisectoral drivers are well known, yet go on unabated – conflicts, climate change and economic shocks. The session will look at current trends and challenges being experienced in humanitarian operations, how the humanitarian community has scaled-up, adapted and innovated to respond to this crisis in humanitarian contexts, and explore lessons learned in order to better understand and respond to the challenges being faced. It will also focus on actions and recommendations that can be transformative to help to prevent and address rising food insecurity and famine risk now and into the future.

10:00am-12.30pm panel: Addressing protection risks, needs, and challenges in humanitarian emergencies, particularly the disproportionate impact on women and children

With humanitarian needs at record levels, this panel will discuss the evolving protection risks, needs and challenges in humanitarian emergencies – especially for women and children who are disproportionally affected. Protection risks and needs are increasing because of different and sometimes compounding factors – such as the escalation of armed conflict, the increasing frequency and intensity of extreme weather events and disasters, the record levels of displacement and food insecurity – and are ever more so affecting women and children and especially those with disabilities. The session will include a discussion of the key trends, issues and experiences and their implications for affected people and for humanitarian operations. It will consider how humanitarian organizations are working to prevent, minimize and respond to protection needs and

risks faced, and to save lives, reduce suffering and protect people's human dignity. It will include a focus on the importance of respect for and the promotion of international humanitarian law, refugee law and human rights law in humanitarian contexts. This discussion will draw lessons from ongoing humanitarian system-wide efforts on the centrality of protection. It will also include consideration of practices to increase women's participation in decision-making for humanitarian programmes, and address trends in gender-based violence and child protection. It will focus on what is being done – and what more can be done – to prevent and respond to protection challenges in humanitarian crises.

The panel will discuss effective ways for different levels and actors to complement and reinforce respective preparedness and response activities undertaken by, inter alia, national disaster management authorities, regional organizations, local and international humanitarian non-governmental organizations, affected communities, the United Nations, and international financial institutions. The panel will also identify practical ways for reinforcing the localization of humanitarian assistance and the role of affected people and communities through stronger partnerships and discuss examples of innovative initiatives.

Extreme weather events and climate-related disasters are driving increased levels of humanitarian needs and compounding risks and vulnerability. The last decade was the warmest on record, with record glacier melt and ocean heat. If current trends continue, the number of disasters per year globally is projected to increase from around 400 in 2015 to 560 per year by 2030 – an increase of 40% during the lifetime of the Sendai Framework on Disaster Risk Reduction. Based on current trends, droughts are projected to increase by more than 30% between 2000 and 2030, while the number of extreme temperature events per year will likely almost triple between 2001 and 2030. Extreme weather events and climate change have multifold ramifications –

compounding risks, increasing the intensity and severity of disasters, fueling displacement, increasing competition over resources, feeding sea-level rise, food insecurity, spread of diseases amongst others. This panel will discuss how humanitarian system is adapting and innovating in the face of increasingly frequent and devastating natural and climate-related disasters and their impacts on the most vulnerable, including early warning-early action systems and anticipatory approaches. The panel will consider the implications of trends for the humanitarian sector and discuss what more is needed to prevent, prepare, responding and mitigate the impacts for affected communities in humanitarian crises and help building resilience, especially in the face of recurring disasters. The discussion will explore opportunities and enablers for strengthening collaboration with relevant actors.
